SAN BERNARDINO, CA—Thirty students from seven San Bernardino City Unified School District schools were recognized for their knowledge of African-American history at the 2011 Black History Bee, held February 8, 9, and 10. The Bee, sponsored each year by the Delta Rho Chapter of the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc., tests students' knowledge of African-American history in a format similar to a spelling bee. The students competed in teams of two and answered questions about famous African Americans from various periods of American history.

In the third- and fourth-grade division, Raven Robinson and Phillip Nikol of Bonnie Oehl

Elementary School took first place. Yunive Sanz-Lopez and Miracle Holifield of Barton Elementary School took second place, and Gabriel Knerr and Maryjane Guadalupe, also of Barton, took third place.

There was a four-way tie for first place in the fifth- and sixth-grade division. First-place winning teams were Alyssa Hall and Rachel Knerr, Autumm Steenburgen and Ocean Rodriguez, all of Barton Elementary School; Frank Trujillo and Victor Chavez, Antonio Flores and Vicente Chavez, all of Cole Elementary School.

Second place went to Kaylee Anstine and Jasmine Cusimano of Davidson Elementa-

ry School; and Francis Barron and Veronica Morales of Cole Elementary earned third place. In the middle school division, six teams tied for first place: Marisol Zarate and Isabel Torres, Ivan Garcia and Aaron Ainsworth, Jasmine Chan and Marissa Kilpatrick, and Alejandra Davila and Nicholas Ainsworth, all from Chavez Middle School; Monica Gutierrez and Erika Gutierrez of Rodriguez PREP Academy; and Traviana Kazee and Semaj Davis of Shandin Hills Middle School. The Bee was one of several Black History Month events presented at various schools throughout the district.

State Attorney General Files Lawsuit in Computer Business Fraud Scam That Targeted Black Churches

LOS ANGELES, CA— Last Monday, February 28, California Attorney General Kamala D. Harris filed a lawsuit

against several businesses for perpetrating a fraud against numerous African American churches. Claiming damages and restitution over \$800,000, the state alleges in a suit filed in Los Angeles Superior Court that these businesses ran a scam that defrauded 33 Black churches in Southern California. The entire scam actually encompassed 195 Black churches in 15 different states, which indicates that federal action may also be in the making.

The churches were approached by promoters who were targeting Black churches on leasing computer kiosks

First 5 Funds Dental Care for Young Children Throughout County



SAN BERNARDINO COUNTY, CA— February is National Children’s Dental Health Month, and First 5 San Bernardino is reminding parents and caregivers about the importance of brushing and taking care of their children’s teeth. The American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry estimates nearly 50 percent of children have tooth decay before age five. “Poor dental health is a preventable condition for our children,” says Karen Scott, Executive Director of First 5 San Bernardino, which promotes the importance of oral health for children and pregnant women and provides funding for dental checkups and treatment for young children and pregnant women through its Oral Health Initiative (OHI). Over 16,000 children were served by OHI pro-

viders last year. First 5 San Bernardino currently funds six oral health programs.

“Every child between the age of 0-5 can get excellent dental care in San Bernardino County” says Dr. Jane Ellis of the Arrowhead Regional Medical Center’s First 5 Dental Program. Good oral health is important for the overall healthy development of young children. A pregnant woman’s oral health impacts the health of her baby, and a young child’s good oral health is important to learning and school success.

Begin taking care of children’s teeth and gums early on. Take your child to the dentist by age one, or when the first tooth appears. Start brushing your child’s teeth as soon as the first tooth appears and remember an adult

needs to help children brush until around age 7. Pregnant women should visit their dentist and get needed treatment.

San Bernardino County Hospitals Improve Practices to Increase Breast-feeding Rates of New Mothers

SAN BERNARDINO, CA—San Bernardino County hospitals have demonstrated leadership in the State by adopting baby friendly practices that have significantly increased the number of newborns that receive only breast milk. The overall percentage of infants leaving the county’s hospitals exclusively breastfeeding increased from 38.4% in 2007 to 58.5% in 2009. Eleven of the thirty-four California hospitals that have obtained “Baby-Friendly” status are located in San Bernardino County.

According to the report “One Hospital at a Time: Overcoming Barriers to Breastfeeding,” by the University of California, Davis Human Lactation Center and the California WIC Association (CWA), hospital practices such as providing skilled support staff, allowing mothers and babies to stay together after birth, and no routine supplementation with formula, play a pivotal role in helping mothers to succeed at breastfeeding, increase breastfeeding rates.

“Policies and practices that promote breastfeeding are cost effective and clearly a necessary component of standard, high-quality care. Hospital administrators must understand the relationship between hospital practices and breastfeeding rates, and take action to secure breastfeeding friendly environments,” according to Maxwell Ohikhuare, M.D., the Health Of-



ficer for the County of San Bernardino Dept. of Public Health.

To achieve Baby-Friendly Designation, hospitals must complete all of the requirements determined by Baby-Friendly USA (www.babyfriendlyusa.org), demonstrating that they have correctly integrated all “10 Steps to Successful Breastfeeding” healthy newborns. Baby-Friendly hospitals in San Bernardino county include Arrowhead Regional Medical Center, Barstow Community Hospital, Community Hospital of San Bernardino, Inland Midwife Services-The Birth Center (Redlands), Kaiser Permanente Medical Center (Fontana), Loma

Linda University Children’s Hospital, Robert E. Bush Naval Hospital, St. Bernardine Medical Center, St. Mary Medical Center, and San Antonio Community Hospital.

Breastfeeding significantly reduces children’s risk for infections and chronic disease such as diabetes, asthma, and obesity; and results in children needing fewer medications and doctor visits. Mothers benefit with weight loss and reduction in their risk for type 2 diabetes, as well as breast and ovarian cancers. New Portal Helps Parents Track Their Students' Progress in the San Bernardino City Schools District

SAN BERNARDINO, CA— The San Bernardino City Unified School District now has a new online tool that allows parents to keep tabs on their children's class assignments, due dates, grades, and attendance. The new Aeries Parent Portal is a secure, Web-based program that gives parents a real-time look at test scores, missing class work, and homework, as well as class schedules, absences, tardies, and unofficial transcripts for middle school and high school students. It will be phased in for elementary grades.

Superintendent Dr. Arturo Delgado sees the parent portal as a powerful tool that lets parents become more involved in their children's education. "We're excited about bringing parents this technology to make it easier for them to be more involved in their children's education, and give them instant access to see how their children are doing in each class. It's like having a progress report from each teacher."

Richardson PREP HI Middle School became one of the first District schools to pilot the Parent Portal last school year, and about 50% of the parents have signed up and regularly use the system. According to parent Abigail Medina, who has two children at Richardson and one at San Geronio High School, "I get access to so much information in just a matter of seconds. It's a must for parents who want to know how



their children are doing without having to call or email each teacher."

The Aeries Parent Portal gives parents a chance to intervene early if their child is struggling in school or isn't attending class. Additional features are also planned for phasing in, such as the ability to trigger an email alert to parents when a stu-

dent's grade falls below a certain level or an absence is recorded. In addition to the Parent Portal, a Student Portal is also available for students. The Parent Portal can be accessed at https://portal.sbcusd.com/abi_parent, but a parent must first obtain account information from their child's school and create their personal account.

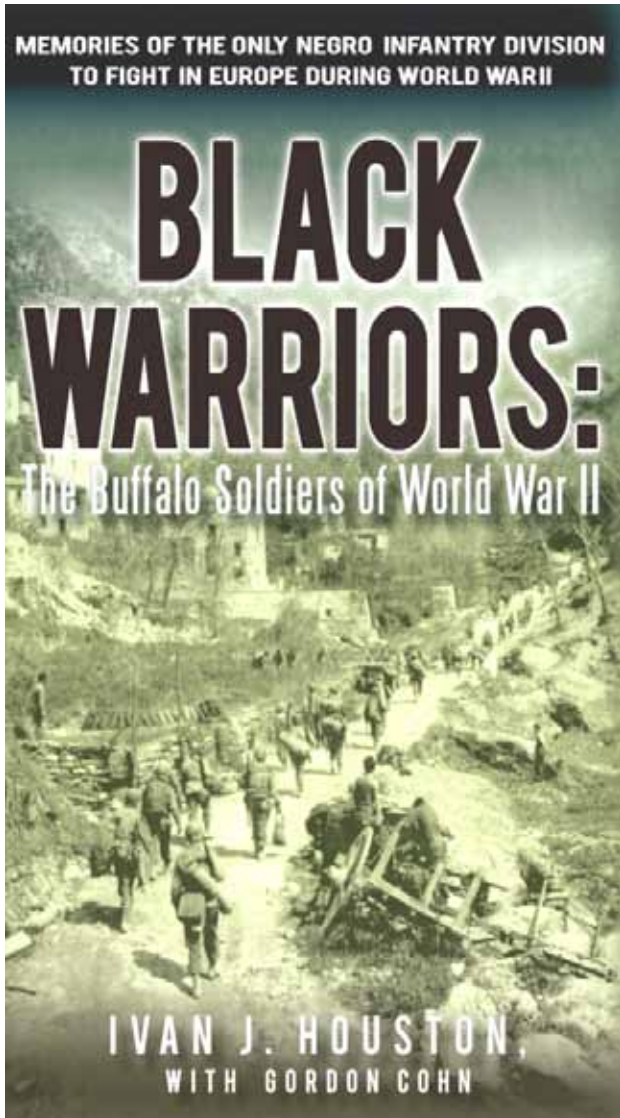
Tune Into "Empire Talks Back" This Sunday March 5th
New Book Chronicles the Extraordinary
Actions of the Only All-Black WWII
Infantry Unit in Europe

 LOS ANGELES, CA—Soldiers know no greater honor than being allowed to fight for their country. However, what if your country views you as a second class citizen; as three fifths of a person? The new book "Black Warriors: The Buffalo Soldiers of World War II" provides a first-hand account of the heroic exploits of Regimental Combat Team 370, of the all black 92nd Infantry Division of the U.S. Army during World War II. These soldiers found themselves fighting the Axis countries as well as racism from their fellow soldiers.

Author and former sergeant major Ivan J. Houston will be the very special guest of host Wallace Allen on the "Empire Talks Back" radio show this Sunday, March 6 at 10 a.m. on KCAA 1050 AM and on WebTV at kcaaradio.com. An mp3 audio download will also be available this week at wssnews.com.

The 92nd Infantry Division was the only Negro Infantry Division to fight in Europe during World War II, and Combat Team 370 was its elite regimen, comprised of enlisted men who were primarily southern Negroes, well-educated black junior officers and white senior officers from southern states. The 92nd Infantry Division was organized in such a way that no black officer or soldier would ever command a white officer or soldier, even



in combat.

Author Ivan Houston was an enlisted soldier in the 370 and kept the Units' Operations Journal, recording every detail of each engagement the unit was involved in as well as the day-to-day operations. Unlike Stephen Ambrose's "Band of Brothers", which was based on interviews and recollection of the men of Easy Company, "Black Warriors" is unique, as Houston has taken the official archive, the log of the 370's actions in Europe, and constructed an unvarnished portrait of life as a soldier of color in a military that was convinced they would fail. The 370 unit proved them wrong time and time again, demonstrating that courage and valor have no color.

Ivan J. Houston received a B.S. degree from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1948. During his active duty military service in the army, he re-

ceived the combat Infantryman's Badge, the Bronze Star, and the Purple Heart for wounds received in action. From 1970 to 1990 Mr. Houston was the Chief Executive Officer of Golden State Mutual Life Insurance Company, which his father Norman O. Houston, a WWI veteran had co-founded. Houston also served on several Fortune 500 Corporation boards of directors, and was named by Ebony Magazine for 14 consecutive years as one of America's Most Influential African Americans. Houston was knighted by Pope John Paul II as a Knight of St. Gregory the Great in 1993.

State Attorney General Files Lawsuit in Computer Business Fraud Scam

which they said would enhance the experience of the congregation without the church incurring any costs. However, the scam ended up creating big debts for the churches. The defendants named in the Attorney General's lawsuit includes Television Broadcasting Online, Ltd., Urban Interfaith Network, Willie Perkins, Michael Morris, Wayne Wilson, Tanya Wilson, Balboa Capital Corp., and United Leasing Associates of America, Ltd. It charges them with violations of the state's unfair competition and false advertising laws, and seeks restitution, civil penalties and an injunction to prevent any further illegal activities.

Banc of America Leasing and Capital LLC, a subsidiary of Bank of America Corporation is not specifically named in this lawsuit. However, it is one of the leasing businesses involved with at least 3 of the churches targeted by this scam, and its records were also subpoenaed as a part of the investigation. Several defendants are unnamed and may be included in the "DOES 1 through 15, inclusive..." mentioned in the complaint.

"This was a cruel and hypocritical scheme," said Attorney General Harris. "The perpetrators preyed on institutions of faith. Let this be a lesson to others who may look to defraud our community organizations: you will be caught and you will be held accountable."

The lawsuit states that defendants Television Broadcasting Online, Ltd., Urban Interfaith

Network, Willie Perkins, and Michael Morris "engaged in a nationwide scam" in which they persuaded "195 African American churches in 15 different states to enter into expensive and onerous leases for shoddy computer equipment housed in wooden cabinets." They promised the churches the kiosks would be free, advertisers would make the lease payments and the churches would be under no financial obligation. By 2006, the scam reached California, where 33 African American churches were persuaded to enter into leases for the kiosks.

Twenty-four of the churches are located in Los Angeles County, five in Riverside County and four in San Bernardino County, including St. Paul A.M.E., New Hope Missionary Baptist Church, and Temple Missionary Baptist Church, and Ecclesia Christian Fellowship. The Riverside County churches included A.K. Quinn AME Church in Moreno Valley, Allen Chapel A.M.E. in Riverside, a church located in Murrieta, and a church located in Perris.

Defendants Wayne and Tanya Wilson -- on behalf of Television Broadcasting Online, Ltd., Urban Interfaith Network, Willie Perkins and Michael Morris -- pitched themselves to the California churches, according to the Attorney General's complaint, as representing "a business/religious entity, national in scope, with strong ties to both the African American community and enlightened corporate sponsors" that

wanted to help churches. They said the computer kiosks would connect the churches and their parishioners to "national advertisers, government, businesses and even generate some revenue for themselves." When the churches failed to pay the monthly lease payments, Balboa and United filed collection suits, seeking full payment plus interest, attorneys' fees and costs.

According to the Attorney General's complaint, the leasing companies, Balboa and United, are liable because the other defendants were acting as their agents and because, even after the leasing companies learned of the misrepresentations, they failed to alert churches to the scam and vigorously continued to enforce the terms of the leases. Wayne and Tanya Wilson live in Rancho Cucamonga. Balboa Capital Corp. is based in Irvine. United Leasing is based in Brookfield, Wisconsin. Urban Interfaith Network, Inc. and Television Broadcasting Online, Ltd. are based in Oxon Hill, Maryland. Perkins and Morris were convicted in Michigan of racketeering, conspiracy, and false pretenses in connection with the scam. Morris is serving 5 to 20 years, and Perkins is serving 4 to 20 years.
