– a time of suffering and desolation unlike this world has ever experienced is on the horizon.


Don't wait until it's too late! Prepare!



Death Row Inmate Transfer to
Chino Institution for Men (CIM)



SAN BERNARDINO, CA---- San Bernardino County Sheriff Shannon Dicus, District Attorney Jason Anderson, and I are raising concerns over the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation's (CDCR) decision to transfer death row inmates to San Bernardino County.

Chino Institution for Men (CIM) is receiving the third highest transfer of inmates in the state, following the closure of San Quentin's death row by Governor Gavin Newsom who announced his plan to transition San Quentin into a rehabilitation center.

The transfer of death row inmates to CIM creates tangible public safety concerns for local residents. CIM has a history of infrastructure deficiencies that have resulted in several well-documented, recent escapes.


Relocating this category of inmate to CIM is irresponsible and ignores the realities of what the facility is capable of handling.



Working Group: More Entry-Level Homes Could Help Solve Housing Crisis

The Community Housing Working Group hosted a briefing on April 23 at Cafeteria 15L in Sacramento. Discussions focused on how the housing crisis in California affects Black and Brown communities and explored ways to provide low-income families and individuals with affordable housing.

Tia Boatman Patterson, CEO and President of the California Communities Reinvestment Corporation, said "entry-level housing" is not available as it was in the past, adding that affordable units were a major point of entry into homeownership for many families in the Black community.

"My mother bought her first house when I was in junior high. It was an 850-square foot, twobedroom and one-bathroom house in 1978. That house cost \$30,000," Boatman-Patterson said.

"A woman working part-time at JCPenney was able to afford that house. We don't build these types of housing now. We do not build entry-level homeownership," she added.

The Community Housing Working Group is a collection of diverse community organizations from across California working together to address housing challenges in their communities. The organization believes that

solving the affordable housing crisis will require creating enough smaller, lower-cost, multi-family homes located near jobs, transit, and good schools.

The briefing included a panel discussion titled, "Exclusionary Zoning: A Look Back and a Path Forward." Boatman-Patterson participated in that session along with Henry "Hank" Levy, Treasurer-Tax Collector for Alameda County, and Noerena Limón, consultant, Unidos U.S., and Board Member of California Housing Finance Agency.



"For years, I've been raising concerns about the lack of a viable emergency plan for the Cajon Pass," said Supervisor Cook. "Whether it's a major earthquake, wildfire, or another disaster, a shutdown of I-15 could isolate our First District communities. I've been a strong advocate for a backup plan, and this study is a critical step forward."

The approval comes after former Assemblymember Thurston "Smitty" Smith secured \$1 million in the 2022 state budget for a Cajon Pass I-15 Bypass Study. The focus of this project is to assess the feasibility of utilizing State Routes 247 and 62 as an alternative route during emergencies that force the closure of the Cajon Pass.

"The State Route 247/62 Emergency Bypass Study

will explore how to best utilize these existing roadways as a more viable alternative to I-15 during emergencies," Supervisor Cook continued. "The project's goal is to minimize the negative impacts of an extended I-15 closure. This includes examining operational strategies to maintain traffic flow for essential services like freight transport, personal travel, and emergency response teams."

The study will also factor in existing traffic management plans developed by law enforcement, transportation agencies, and emergency service providers for situations involving I-15 closures and major inci-

The contract, upon approval by the full SBCTA Board in May, will officially greenlight the project.
